The Luminaria of Ivyland

An illuminating Christmas tradition for many in the US is the use of luminarias to light pathways during the holiday season. Luminarias or farolitos, depending on where you live, are paper bags with lit candles inside. The crafted lights were first used in New Mexico to direct paths to residents' front doors and the local church on Christmas Eve, showing the way for the Holy Family. Originally, New Mexicans used small bonfires to light the way but after 1872, when the flat-bottom paper bag was invented, they found that a bag weighed down with sand and a candle didn't take from their firewood and was cheaper than the delicate Chinese paper lanterns. From then on, the modern luminaria was born and the tradition quickly spread throughout the country.

Now, many cities in the US host their own Luminaria festivals to make the days surrounding Christmas merry and bright. So how did the tradition start in Ivyland? It turns out Lincoln Avenue resident Bronwyn "Bonnie" Rowe brought the idea with her when she moved to Ivyland in 1976. Bonnie had seen luminaria displays in Hatboro and thought it would be a wonderful addition to our borough. For years, Bonnie organized the ordering of the bags and candles for all the neighbors who wished to participate and convinced the borough to have sand delivered to the Fire House parking lot for all to use. In recent years, Pat & Phil Klein – also of Lincoln Avenue – have been handling the orders through the now familiar "Luminaria Letter" and coordinating the distribution to participating residents. So when you admire the wondrous spectacle of our candlelit streets on Christmas Eve, you can thank Bonnie and the Kleins for helping make it happen.

When to Light. The tradition for the borough has been to light the luminaria on Christmas Eve around 6PM. If the weather is not good, the "raindate" is Christmas Day evening. If you didn't order your luminaria bags and candles, you can still get them on Amazon. Also, if you have older neighbors, it's always a kind gesture to put some extras out for them as well. After all, it is the season.

Ivyland Bonfire and Hayride

During a crisp fall evening, there is nothing better than sitting by a roaring fire, roasting marshmallows and chatting with friends and family. On October 19th, Ivyland residents got to do just that during the timehonored Ivyland Bonfire. More than 20 years ago, longtime resident and founder of the Ivyland Heritage Association Ed Oldroyd began organizing the bonfire, which has since evolved into a borough tradition with plenty of refreshments and horse drawn wagon "hayrides", officially marking the beginning of the colder months.

A true symbol of fall festivities in the US, bonfires' roots actually stretch all the way back to the 10th century in Gaelic Ireland. During the festival of Samhain, which marked the end of the summer and the beginning of the "darker" months, the Celtic people would gather on hilltops and light a bonfire as an offering to the gods. It was believed that during Samhain, spirits, both bad and good, were allowed to travel freely to the living world. The bonfires, as a sign of celebration, would ward off any dark and evil spirits. At the end of the festival, the embers from the fire would be spread across the fields for luck and protection until the next harvest season.

Centuries later, fall bonfires still bring communities together to celebrate. Special thanks to Granieri Landscaping, A Better Way Farm (hayrides), the Ivyland Fire Company and the entire Park & Rec Committee and borough volunteers for helping the Ivyland community to continue to come together.

Winter is almost officially here and this can be a difficult time for aquatic life due to runoff of deicing materials to surface waters. Excess salt and other deicing chemicals can harm aquatic life in our streams and impact drinking water supplies.

Some environmentally-friendly snow removal practices to help keep Ivyland's streams and groundwater clean:

- Shovel snow before it turns to ice to limit the need for deicing chemicals like rock salt.
- Shovel snow onto permeable surfaces including gently sloping and level landscape and grassy areas so as the snow melts it will soak into the ground rather than flow directly into a nearby storm

If you must use deicing chemicals, follow these suggestions...

- Control application of chemical deicers and avoid over application.
- · Limit chemical applications near environmentally-sensitive areas including springs, streams, ponds, wetlands, and water supply areas and sensitive landscape and vegetation.
- Use salt substitutes that are less harmful including Calcium Chloride (CaCl2) and Calcium Magnesium Acetate (CMA).
- After snowmelt, sweep up residues, including sand, to prevent it from washing into storm drains and streams.

Why should I limit my use of salt and other chemical deicing products?

Deicing products contain chemical constituents that can be harmful to the environment including water resources and drinking water supplies. For example, sodium can break down soil structure and decrease soil permeability, which adversely impacts vegetation and soil microbes; chloride mobilizes heavy metals and impacts fresh water supplies including ground and surface waters; and heavy metal components can adversely impact water quality, plant and aquatic life.
